A Biographical Study of Timothy

A biographical Bible study examines the life of a person mentioned in Scripture. To get the most complete picture of the person, all Scriptural references are observed.

The Bible does not include all the details of each life mentioned, only what God chose to include. The only detail of most people mentioned in Scripture is their names (i.e. 1 Chronicles 1-9). There are some Bible characters that have chapters describing their lives and others that only have a few sentences. God has carefully chosen the details He wants given of those He included in His Word.

It is interesting to notice the details the Lord leaves out as well as what He includes. A description of someone's physical appearance is often not given. We sometimes come to conclusions about people simply based on what they look like. However, Scripture tells us that God looks at man differently than we do; He sees the heart (1 Samuel 16:7).

There are some details God included that may be difficult for us to understand. Some may wonder why genealogies are a part of the Bible. According to Nelson's Bible Dictionary, genealogy was very important in ancient times, especially to the Israelites. Genealogy was used to determine inheritance rights and land allotments. It was important in deciding who were qualified by birth to serve as priests. Genealogy played an important role in demonstrating the fulfillment of prophecy (i.e. Genesis 49:10; Luke 3:33). We can trust that what God has placed in His Word is important for us to know.

There is so much to learn from the lives that are recorded in Scripture. One of those lives is Timothy whom Paul regarded as a faithful servant of Christ. He served the Lord with his whole heart. The details of his life that God included in His Word have much to teach us.

o Timothy accompanied Paul on most of his second and third missionary journeys. Acts 16:1-21:14. He is mentioned by name in Acts 16:1, 17:14-15, 18:5, 19:22, and 20:4. Skim through these Scriptures to get an idea of what Timothy experienced as Paul's companion on those journeys.

Persecution

 On these missionary travels, Paul and his companions experienced persecution. What do you think Timothy would have learned from watching Paul's response to persecution? Acts 16:16-34, 17:2-10, and 18:1-11.

Sent to Churches to Minister

- o To which churches did Paul send Timothy to minister? Acts 17:10-14; 1 Corinthians 4:17; Philippians 2:19; 1 Thessalonians 3:1-2, and 1 Timothy 1:2-3.
- o What does this say about Paul's trust in Timothy?

Joins Paul in Rome

 Paul was imprisoned after his third missionary journey. It is unknown if Timothy accompanied Paul to Rome right away or joined him later. How do we know Timothy was with Paul in Rome? Philippians 1:1, 2:19; Colossians 1:1, and Philemon 1. (Paul wrote these books, plus Ephesians, from a Roman prison.)

Paul's Heart Toward Timothy

What was Paul's heart toward his companion? 1 Corinthians 4:17; Philippians 2:19-22, and
 2 Timothy 1:2-4

Character

What do you learn about Timothy's character and faith? Acts 16:2; 1 Corinthians 4:17, 16:10;
