"I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." 2. Read verses 12-21. List the phrases from verses 12-14 which reflect Paul's desire to continue to grow spiritually. • What words or phrases best describe your desire for spiritual growth? 3. In verse 12, Paul acknowledged that Christ had laid hold of him for a purpose; he was determined to pursue that purpose. What do you learn about Christ's purpose for Paul? Acts 9:1-15, 26:16-18; Galatians 1:15-16 4. God has a definite purpose for each of us. What does 2 Timothy 1:9 say regarding this? o What do you believe is God's purpose for your life? o How are you pursuing that purpose? Paul's statement in verse 13, "but one thing I do" reflects his single purpose. Which verse in 5.

13.	Hebrews 11 is a record of many faithful saints from the Old Testament. Read this chapter and give some examples of how an eternal perspective helped them to endure suffering.
In Ph Wha [.] have	ner explanation of our "resurrected body" ilippians 3:21, it states that when Christ returns, He will give believers a new, glorious body like His. It does that mean and how will it be done? Scripture has not answered all the questions we may about this topic, but it has provided some explanation. The commentaries of Bill MacDonald, ten Wiersbe and David Guzik have also been utilized to help answer these questions.

How is a "natural" body resurrected to a "spiritual" body?

Paul answered this by giving the analogy of a seed in 1 Corinthians 15:35-38. A seed produces a plant, not another seed. The plant is not the same as the seed it comes from, but there is a vital connection between them. The seed is planted, it dies and from that death comes life.

One of the commentators explained, "When you bury the body of a believer, you are "sowing a seed" that will come out of the earth as a resurrection body. It is buried as a natural body and by the power of God is raised a new spiritual body.

How does a "natural" body compare to a "spiritual" body?

Both have a physical body but they are very different. The natural body is described in 1 Corinthians 15:42-44 as sown in corruption, dishonor, and weakness. Our present physical bodies are subject to disease, weakness, aging, and death.

On the other hand, the spiritual body will be raised without corruption. It will be raised in glory and in power. It will no longer be subject to disease, weakness, aging, or death. It will be a body perfectly suited for heaven.

What about the believers alive at the Rapture; how do they receive a resurrected body?

1 Corinthians 15: 50-53 helps answer this question. In verse 51 Paul said, "We shall not all sleep." The word "sleep" in this context means to experience death. All believers whether alive or dead, will receive a spiritual body at the Rapture of the church. In verse 51 it goes on to say, "We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed." Then in verse 53 he stated the corruptible must put on the incorruptible; meaning those alive at the Rapture will receive a resurrection body as well.

What was Christ's resurrection body like?

- o It was a physical body. He asked the disciples to touch Him to see that He was not a spirit but had flesh and bones. (Luke 24:40-41)
- He ate food after His resurrection. He asked the disciples if they had anything to eat and they gave Him some fish and honeycomb. (Luke 24:41-43)
- He was not bound by the laws of nature in His resurrected body. He disappeared while two disciples were talking with Him and appeared in a room when the doors were shut. (Luke 24:31, John 20:19, 26)
